To Exchange Program and International Research Program Applicants,

Hitotsubashi University Health Center would like to share medical information and available service in Japan, so that some of you may need time to prepare prescribed medication from your home country.

Medical information

Hitotsubashi University has a Health Center, but it is unable to prescribe medication. If you wish to be prescribed medication, please visit a medical institution off-campus. You must enroll in national health insurance to receive treatment at a medical institution in Japan. (The detailed information regarding health insurance will be provided during International Student Orientation.)

- The Health Center can provide information on the location of and services offered by medical institutions. In Japan you often have to wait several weeks for an appointment at a medical institution, in particular at a psychiatry department, which can offer treatment in a foreign language.
- Japan experienced a large, multi-prefecture measles outbreak in the spring of 2018. Please be sure to be inoculated against measles twice (or MR, MMR, MMRV; stand for measles and rubella, +mumps, +varicella, respectively) before coming to Japan. Many cases have been reported of people contracting measles in airplanes or at airports. In Japan it costs about 10,000 JPY per measles vaccination shot. If you are planning on bringing your family, please make sure everyone has completed their vaccinations before arriving in Japan.

Bringing Your Medication to Japan

If you have been taking medication in your home country (or country in which you currently live), you may be able to bring that medication with you to Japan if you undertake certain procedures prior to your departure.

- Certain medication cannot be brought into Japan. Please check prior to departure. If you
 are unable to bring your regular medication please consult with your physician as soon as
 possible and consider changing to another medication that can be brought into Japan.
- You risk breaking the law and being arrested if you bring medication into Japan without the
 necessary documentation or if you send medication by post. Please be sure to bring
 medication with you in your luggage when coming to Japan.
- If you take medication regularly you are advised to bring a referral letter from your physician written in English (or Japanese) that outlines details of your medical care. Please ensure that any letter is typed, as Japanese physicians may struggle to read handwritten letters.
